




### Histogram for scaled questions

My overall knowledge of the subject matter has increased due to the instruction of this course.



- Explain experience in industry standards
- Fun teacher who was very forgiving and not strict
- Good sense of humor
- Has a great sense of humor and will explain things again and again. Assignments are clearly explained and the needed information is provided on the assignment page.
- He always gives constructive feedback on assignments and answers every question given to him. He provides good examples of what he wants us to do for each assignment as well as a detailed list of what is required.
- He always was ready to help whenever need be, and would give feedback and go over important details of an assignment when asked.
- He has the appropriate working experience suitable for this job. He is highly knowledgeable on elements such as expressions, lighting, storyboarding, and perspective (to name a few), and presents this information in a very entertaining and perky way. His feedbacks/ critiques are highly useful for me, as I feel he is able to point out any area that is in need of improvement.

<sup>3.12)</sup> What could your instructor do in the future to make this a better class?

- Admittedly I got confused about what I personally needed to have done and turned in for certain assignments. Part of that could be my fault, but I also think that better conveying the required tasks to the students would be an improvement for the class
- Along with the consensus of others, he does grade too hard for a 100 level class. This course is required for our major and not a lot of people are artists, so grading like it is a 300 level art class can fail some people and block them from progressing in the major.
- Although my instructor has, "high expectations so that you should take pride in your work and work toward premium work so that you can get the best out of the class" the grading does have high expectations too which I feel at times are hard to keep up with and achieve, making this class very demanding.
- As a student, I advise more time for assignments. Perhaps a maximum of 3 weeks would do for storyboards and animatics.
- For a 100 level class assignments can be graded rather harshly. Assignments take far longer for students without previous drawing skill which could be given more consideration.
- Get rid of presentations, but I understand that is something that should be a part of the class. Figure out a way to have all assignments to be turned into one folder instead of having multiple places to submit parts of your project.
- Give me examples of acceptable assignments to turn in and why. Under the brief for each assignment can you please make it crystal clear exactly what needs to be turned in and what it needs to be labeled, the submission instructions can feel convoluted at times.
- Had a little more time to work on a project without having to lose day in class to work
- Have periodic check ins more frequently to reassure everyone they are doing the assignment correctly. slow down a a bit during lectures so that people can take well endowed notes and maybe add more details for sketches so that people can have more of a variety to work on
- He could be a little more lenient in his grading at times. He seems to grade harder than necessary at times which hurts my overall performance in the class. He could also give a little more time on some assignments. The past paced nature of the class makes it hard to keep up while still maintaining the level of work that he expects.
- He is a great instructor and I love coming to class but he's kind of a harsh grader for a 100 level class. He's probably grading assignments from an industry standard so I guess I can't complain too much.
- Honestly, I think it is more of a question of what can the department do to help him out? I would love to be able to take a second level of this course instructed by Kevin or even get a class or two together that focus on even more elements of character design and storyboarding that Kevin obviously could show his students. I think he is a very valuable addition to the program and I absolutely love this class. I think what he could do to make it better is have more of it!
- I feel like the instructor should keep a bit more organized on how he teaches. Sometimes it seems he is rushing along one thing to get to another, usually because he keeps conversations with students throughout. It's nice having a teacher to converse with during class, but I think shortening the time a little will help stop making the class feel rushed in the last 10 minutes or so.
- I found his grading system far too harsh for a class with such strong art requirements and high expectations for students. He seems to forget that it is a required course and not every student in the class is an artist or any desire to become one.
- I would like to see more detail put into the concept side of class. I wish more was covered than just character design. There's so much more that goes into concept design than just character design. I know that curriculum is out of Kevin's control for the most part but if saying

it here helps expand the course than I will.

- It may be great to teach students about painting textures also, because it is one of the most essential elements for painting and designing.
- Making lectures available to students online would make a great resource as most of the slides consist of images.
- Maybe be a bit more specific on assignment descriptions I guess.
- More Time on assignments
- Not much, the work load is overall not too bad and the class itself is very interesting
- Perhaps keep more structure and order about what is due for assignments and naming conventions. There were many times where I was super confused about what was meant to be turned in and how to name them.
- Present example material for students to look at (such as a potential student submission or his own mock up of the assignment) because (from what my classmates and I have discussed) he is bad at fully informing students of his expectations of us AND grades very harshly.

He has given examples of industry standards and tried to explain his assignments using bullet points and grading criteria, but he has told us neigh verbatim that "meeting the criteria for assignments is not how one gets an 'A' in this class." This is asinine, we meet criteria and are then graded harshly for not going above and beyond as if every single assignment should be a portfolio piece. That isn't how students operate, especially in a prerequisite introductory class. I'm a mediocre artist with talent enough to get me through this class, but my grade point average will suffer because he is so harsh and I JUST transferred here.

- Put more notes on slides, it's great to hear a lecture, but some people learn by writing it down and yes we do have sketchbooks to take notes during lectures, but sometimes if we forgot something then it we would have to go online somewhere or to the limited notes that we could grab from lecture. Also please can you make the goals of each assignment clearer? They are sometimes confusing to read and understand and most of the time everyone is asking everyone about what is actually due for what day. One last thing, I really don't know how you grade, but not every person coming into the major is an artist, and when I try my best on an assignment trying to follow guidelines and then get a C- back really hurts my chances of passing this course, I already think that I might not pass because I keep getting my hopes up and then they get crushed. Like your expectations are really high for students who took a beginner Photoshop course and a photography class. So maybe more lenient grading would allow people to enjoy this class more in the future.
- The Assignments are sometimes vague on the requests of the professor or worded poorly in a way that many people become confused as to what is being asked for either turn in fulfillment's or the assignments requirements.
- The assignment description on blackboard could be better as well as maybe some examples of what the finished assignment should look like.
- The only thing I think Kevin could do that would help is walk around the class a tiny bit more during exercises to see how the students are doing and see where they are struggling.

- All lectures and assignments were geared towards learning the skills he was trying to teach, teaching through example and practice, and I feel that by the end of the course I will have left with more knowledge about Storyboarding and Concept art than I came in with.
- As a student, Kevin has been one of my favorite professors in my achedemic career. He is more than willing to help his students and is always clear in his expectations. He has motivated me to grow as an artist and I feel like because of this class I will expand even more into the field.
